No. 22 King Street, a large frame house, was built around 1789 by Alexander Chisolm. The mansard roof was added in the late 19th century. (p. 60) No. 22 King Street is situated on the east side of King Street in between Lamboll and Ladson Streets.

***Street addresses changed frequently in the early years of Charleston's development, which makes it difficult to define the exact location of No. 287 King Street in the first decades of the nineteenth century. The years in which Chisholm first appears in city directories as living on King Street, however, and the year in which No. 22 King Street was constructed do match up. There is a possibility that No. 22 King Street was No. 287 King Street during Chisholm's ownership. A further study of maps and the renumbering system of King Street in the nineteenth century will be needed to further confirm this information.
